 - Played a prisoner by mistake
 - Playing through a game record
 - Playing a Go variant where playing an opponent's move is a handicap
 - Placing handicap stones for opponent, then first move
 - Playing a game other than Go on a Go board
- 2) The Go players have met on holiday and are playing Go on the beach using pebbles and shells for stones and a board drawn in the sand; each day the tide washes out the Go board.
- 3) The Go players are at a horseracing event. The man does not realise they are talking about Go and thinks they are talking about races, but there have been no handicap races so far.
